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Care of Acoustic Instruments Guidelines

With proper care and maintenance your new acoustic instrument should provide a lifetime of musical enjoyment. Without proper care and maintenance you can risk voiding your warranty, so here are some important instrument care tips:

- Avoid leaving your instrument in direct sunlight, next to a heater or in a car. Direct or prolonged exposure to heat can dry out woods, leading to shrinkage and cracking.
- Keep your instrument in 40-50% relative humidity. Proper humidity is the
 key to keeping your instrument in top condition. Heaters, fireplaces and air
 conditioning dry the air.
- **Keep your instrument in a case when not in use.** A gig bag may also provide thermal protection (dependant on the bag).
- If you live in an area with extremes in humidity (e.g. ALL OF AUSTRALIA)
 humidity control accessories are necessary. See your local music shop
 for details and humidity control options.
- Gently clean your instrument after use. Build up of atmospheric dust, epidermis, perspiration and rosin can reduce the sound quality of your instrument. Gently wipe these away from the surface and strings with 100% cotton cloth. Application of apporiate polish to your instrument should restore luster to the exterior finish.
- Like your car, your instrument requires a service. As a general rule
 of thumb, your instrument should be taken in for a setup / service by a
 professional luthier at least once a year. For professional players, you may
 need to undertake serveral services a year, depending on the frequency of
 use. For guitars, a neck re-alignment is perfectly normal. Main symptoms
 occuring as a result of problems with the neck relief is high action, or
 significant buzzing. If your guitar presents with any of these problems, you
 are probably due for a service.
- **Loosen the strings when flying.** Due to pressure & temperature changes within an aircraft, damage can occur to the neck of the guitar.
